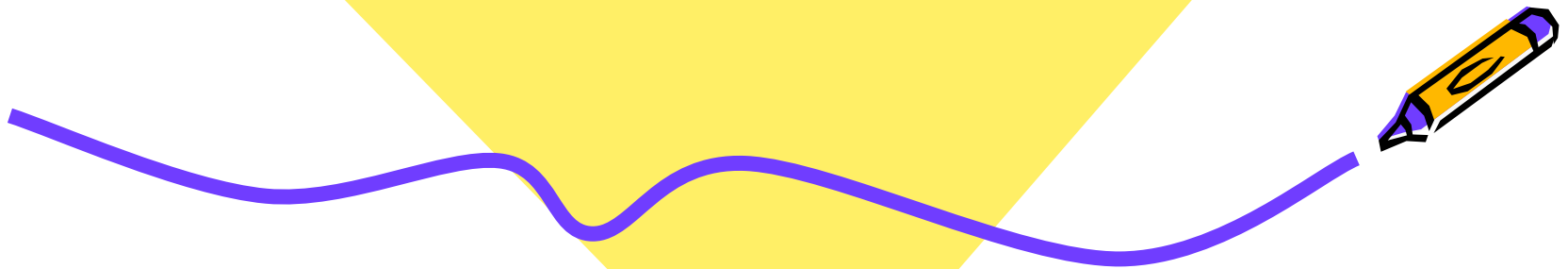

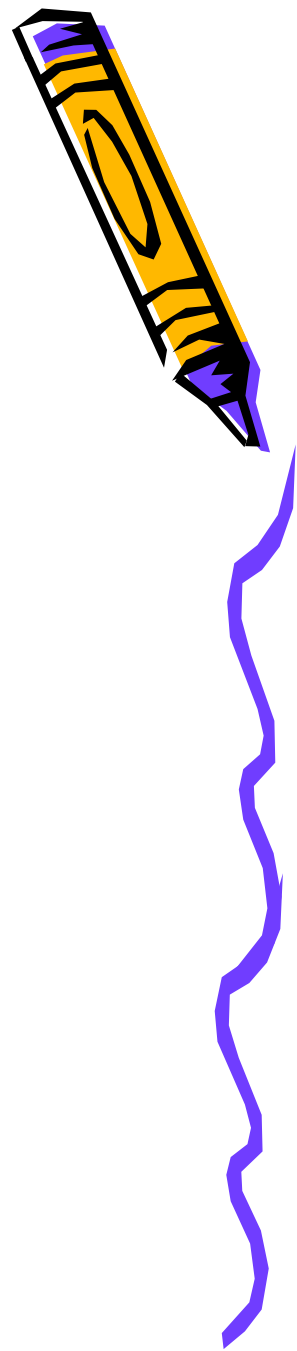

Bullying is when children are mean and unkind to each other, not just once but again and again. They might push a child around, leave them out, or send nasty texts or emails. This can hurt on the inside or on the outside, and often both.





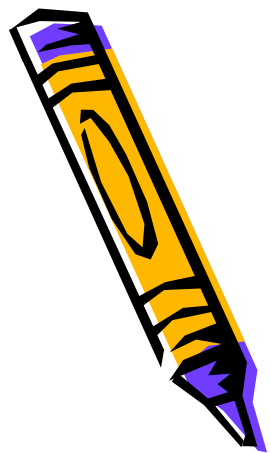
Bullying is NOT OK.



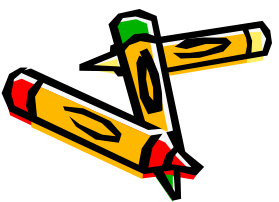


Neglect is when a parent or carer does not look after a child properly. They might not give them enough food and drink, or the right kind of clothing. It can also be when a child is left on their own for too long.

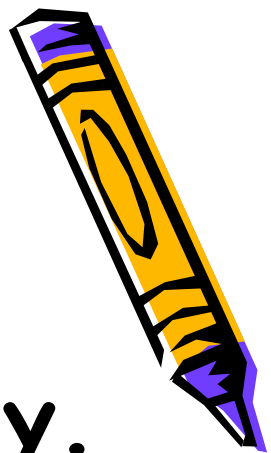




This is NOT OK.



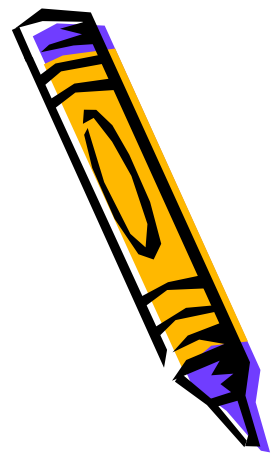
Physical abuse is when an adult deliberately hurts a child's body. They might hit, kick, punch, bite or shake them. This may leave marks on the body such as cuts and bruises.

Emotional abuse is when an adult hurts a child's feelings. They might call them names, make fun of them or make a child feel bad about themselves. This hurts children on the inside.

Seeing or hearing parents or carers hurting each other can also make a child feel bad.

Reflection Behaviours that may warrant a reflection include:

- Children who have been placed on RED.
- Fighting
- Swearing
- Name calling
- Damaging property
- Refusing to obey instructions
- Rudeness towards adults



In the mornings

- Remind children of the links between behaviour and school values
- Put all children back on Green
- Check the BR Log and remind any child that needs to attend Behaviour Reflection where and when

Throughout the day

- Reward positive behaviours by moving children up the rainbow
- Reward with merits, Marvellous Me, Class Tokens, stickers,
- praise pads etc...

End of the day

- Update Class Behaviour Log any child that has been sent to
- partner class or SPOC etc.
- Send letters home if needed and inform SPOC/ AHTs/IDHT

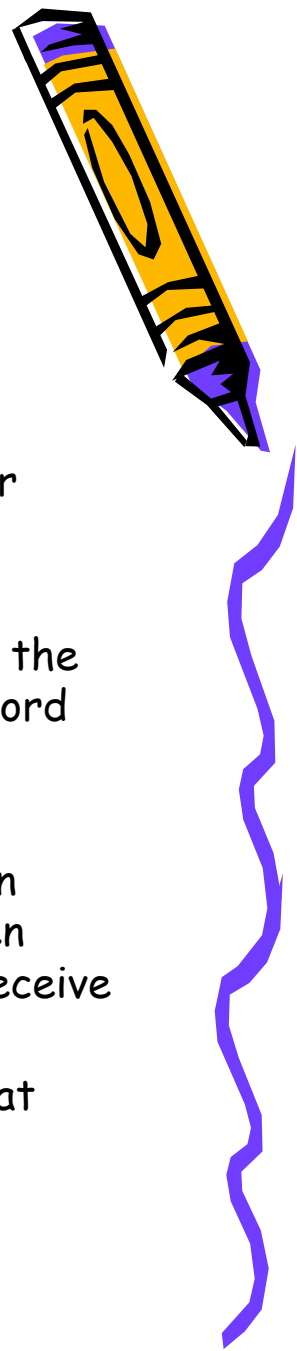


Positive behaviour

- Golden rules will be followed by all children in the dining hall.
- The rules are as follows:
- Use a quiet voice and listen to each other
- Always line up and walk calmly
- Use good table manners when eating
- Be polite and respectful to all
- Leave the dining hall clean and tidy



Changes to lunchtime



- There will be a golden rule of the half term.
- 5 children from KS1 and 5 children from KS2 will be given a golden ticket for displaying the Golden rule of the half term when in the dining hall.
- An allocated member of staff will give out the golden tickets.
- Every Friday the children who have received a golden ticket will take part in the golden ticket raffle to win Friday Lunch Time in the Soft Play Room or Manford Haven - winning tickets to be handed in the SLT Room.
- There will also be Dining Hall Monitors.
- These are children who will support in the dining hall. They will have a book in which to write the names of the children who are displaying any of the golden rules. These will be given to the supervisors each day and the children will receive a raffle ticket.
- All children who wish to play football will sign a football contract to show that they will follow the rules in order for matches to remain calm and orderly.
